Cirrhosis is a disease in which normal liver cells are replaced by scar tissue, which interferes with all of these important functions. In extreme cases, the damage is so severe that the only solution is a liver transplant. Cirrhosis has many causes.

Liver Cirrhosis: A Toolkit for Patients

Cirrhosis is a late stage of scarring (fibrosis) of the liver caused by many forms of liver diseases and conditions, such as hepatitis and chronic alcoholism. Each time your liver is injured — whether by disease, excessive alcohol consumption or another cause — it tries to repair itself. In the process, scar tissue forms.

The low platelet count and the increased INR levels of patients with cirrhosis do not reduce the risk of developing deep vein thrombosis or pulmonary embolism.⁴² Prophylactic anticoagulation benefit is well established and recommended in guidelines for the general population of inpatients,⁹⁹ while major concerns still exist regarding the prophylactic use of anticoagulation in patients with cirrhosis for fear of facilitating bleeding events.

Anticoagulation in the cirrhotic patient

Doctors usually require a strict no-salt diet for people who have cirrhosis with ascites, as a high-sodium diet can make the condition worse. ¹⁴ The daily recommended sodium intake for people with ascites is 88 millimoles per liter (mmol) per day. ¹⁵ The typical American diet contains 200 to 300 mmol of sodium per day.

Various types of cirrhosis may occur in different types of individuals. The most common, Laennec's cirrhosis, occurs in 30% to 50% of cirrhotic patients. Biliary cirrhosis occurs in 15% to 20% of patients. Postnecrotic cirrhosis occurs in 10% to 30% of patients.

The first nutrition priority for the patient with cirrhosis is to promote overall adequate intake regardless of the macronutrient distribution (Fig. (Fig.1). 1). Ensuring overall adequate intake decreases the duration of the fasting state in the body and in turn prevents muscle catabolism.

Liver cirrhosis is the severe scarring of the liver. It's commonly caused by viral infections, from fatty liver resulting from obesity, and from chronic alcohol abuse. A low-sodium, high-protein diet is recommended for liver cirrhosis to prevent or slow complications of the disease and to promote liver health.

Early non-specific symptoms include fatigue and itching. As scar tissue replaces healthy tissue and liver function worsens, a variety of liver-related symptoms may develop. Since the liver performs many complex metabolic functions, there are many possible complications that can develop due to cirrhosis.
