Cognitive and Constructivist Strategies for Teaching

Constructivist teaching methods are based on constructivist learning theory. Along with John Dewey, Jean Piaget researched childhood development and education. Their theories are now encompassed in the broader movement of progressive education. Constructivist learning theory says that all knowledge is constructed from a base of prior knowledge.

Among the strategies for constructivist teaching, this strategy is very effective to promote students' logical thinking and a good way to check understanding. It consists of giving your student a series of things, whether statements or phrases in English or a foreign language studied, or images or symbols representing steps to solve a math problem or to conduct a science experiment in the wrong order.

Why and How Can Teachers Implement Constructivism in the ...

Tam (2000) lists the following four basic characteristics of constructivist learning environments, which must be considered when implementing constructivist teaching strategies: 1) Knowledge will be shared between teachers and students. 2) Teachers and students will share authority. 3) The teacher's role is one of a facilitator or guide.
